Rustic reclamation



Creativity, a love of simplicity and a dedication to repurposing old, discarded materials has inspired Katrin Arens' distinctive range of furniture, showcased perfectly in her beautiful Italian home

caffolding boards seem unlikely items to shape the course of a life but in the case of designer Katrin Arens, these humble objects were the starting point for an unexpected career. Her spacious, rustic home, half an hour from Bergamo in northern Italy, is filled with a mix of stylish furniture.

all made to her own design from a mix of old, salvaged woods. Now the basis of a thriving business, reclaimed timber first interested her as a graphic-design student in her native Germany, when she used it to build a couple of very basic items for her flat. It was when she won a year's sculpture scholarship to the 16th-century hilltop town of Bergamo that she decided to explore the commercial possibilities alongside her studies.

The arcane skills learnt on her course - mixing her own glue and paint to ancient recipes, and the intricacies of traditional furniture restoration - came in handy when making her own pieces. Katrin started experimenting with scaffolding planks, and, despite having no technical knowledge, managed to come up with prototypes for a table and bookshelf.
